snow plows. Fall is a great time to clean out your garage to park your car / cars inside!





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FERNAN RESTORATION PROJECT

Kootenai Environmental Alliance (KEA) will be continuing itsefforts to reduce phosphorus entering Fernan Lake with a demonstration restoration project. KEA will be working with East Side Highway District and Architects West to restore 300 feet of shoreline.

It has been determined that high phosphorous levels in Fernan Lake are a driving factor in the growth and abundance of blue green algae populations within the system. The project will involve re-sloping the bank between the lake and the road to reduce portions of exceptionally steep and highly erodible slopes in those areas with little to no vegetation. This will also remove the rills and channels for runoff and provide a better environment for plants to grow. The shoreline will have erosion control installed at the toe of the slope near the edge of the


lake. The soil will then be amended with compost and volunteers will install native plants, followed by seeding of native grasses. An angler's access point will also be installed with boulders to stabilize the slope and provide easier access to the lake.

KEA needs volunteers to help with this project!

Fernan Lake Study Continues

This summer, University of Idaho researchers continued an ongoing study of nutrient sources to Fernan Lake. Excess nutrients, in particular phosphorus, can lead to increased algae growth, such as the current blue-green bloom on Fernan. Dr. Frank Wilhelm, University of Idaho limnologist, supervised two research projects related to measuring water movement and the distribution of phosphorus throughout the lake.

The first study was a continuation of Daniel King's undergraduate research project from last year, tracking the effects of wind on water surface currents over the entire lake during the daytime. This summer, NIC undergraduate Emery Johnson expanded on King's work by tracking lake surface currents during the early morning hours. The two students used the same system of deploying several surface "drifters" (buoys with GPS units attached to flag-like drogues) at several locations over the lake to collect surface water movement, along with wind speed and direction. They found that during the day, wind and surface water currents were from west to east (up-valley) while at night, the winds and water currents were east to west (down-valley). Based on these studies, water currents are ideal to cause mixing between the lake and the wetland on the east end, contributing nutrients from the wetland to the lake.





To determine the extent of mixing across the wetland/lake boundary, Dr. Wilhelm used fluorescent dye to track water currents. On August 2nd, a research team injected a yellow-green fluorescent dye into the east end of Fernan Lake, near the lily pads. The dye is harmless to aquatic life and breaks down within three-five days. We released dye in two locations just before sunrise and followed the subsequent plumes in boats, taking water measurements as the dye spread and moved through the water column. Meanwhile, an aerial drone flew overhead collecting a series of time-lapse photographs to track the dye's movement.


Unfortunately the house Fernan built burned to the ground so Sam had a house moved on to the site from the Fort Grounds and that's the house which is Heidi and Pat's home now. In the early history of this property it was said that the soldiers pastured their horses here. Colby is now a senior at the University of Idaho majoring in Business and Finance. He obtained his real estate license in 2017 and



years. He wasn't witness to all of the original development of the property which became the village, but obviously has




Colby Acuff credits growing up on Fernan Lake as being a huge part of who he is today and his love of outdoors.


CITY ORDINANCE FOR RECREATIONAL PARKING

Boats, RV's and recreational equipment may be parked in your driveway May 1st—October 1st. Please, no tarps for covering. After October 1st, boats, RV's and recreational equipment must be put into storage. We want everyone to enjoy your Idaho but protect the view of our neighbors and integrity of Fernan.

If the owners, tenants or occupants allow said nuisance to exist or fail to abate the nuisance, they, and each of them, shall be guilty of an infraction, punishable by a fine not to exceed ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$100.00). Each day that a violation of this chapter exists may be charged as a separate offense. Three (3) or more infractions or a failure to pay the infraction penalty shall constitute a misdemeanor.
