

IMPORTANT TO KNOW

NEVER POUR GREASE DOWN THE KITCHEN SINK!

Never pour grease or oil down the drain. The grease will weigh down the floats in your septic tank and cause failure for the pump to turn on. This results in the alarm going off and expensive cleanout of your septic system.

For fats that solidify, <u>let them do so</u>, then pitch them in your regular garbage. **Chill grease in the fridge if you need to get it to harden up.** For ones that don't solidify, pour them into a sealable (<u>hopefully non-recyclable</u>) bottle, and throw the whole container away with your regular garbage OR ABSORB INTO PAPER TOWELS OR NEWSPAPER THEN TOSS 'EM



Tim and Wanda Quinn with their one year old son, Connor, moved into Fernan Lake Village in 1981. Tim was just begining his surgery practice and Wanda

was pregnant with their second child. In searching for a home for their family the Village became a logical choice. They were looking for a family friendly

neighborhood with well kept homes and easy proximity to the hospital. Their second son, Kevin, was born in 1982. Two years later in January, 1984 their daughter Katie was born.

As we visited with Wanda and Tim about their choice of a place to live and their recollections of 36 years living here the names of many other families who became a part of their lives came up. They really lucked out in their immediate neighbors. At that time the village was a good mix of young families and families with older children and also retired residents. The Ouinns were fortunate enough to have the Benings catty corner from them. Jim and Lois and their "older kids" quickly became mentors, helpers and lifelong friends. Tim recalled Jim telling him his little kids needed a swing set and offered to build it for him. He proceeded to build a much larger and sturdier version of what Tim had in mind. That swing set proved to be a popular activity for the neighborhood kids for many years. Wanda also said with Tim's long hours at the hospital and three toddlers, she spent a lot of time "hanging out" with Jim and Lois, either around the kitchen table, in the big TV room or by their pool. The Quinn kids spent many

happy hours in the Bening's pool. She also remembered the first night they had a heavy snowfall and she heard a roaring noise outside. Looking out the window she saw Frank, Bening's teenage son, riding up and down the street on his snowmobile. Eventually, their good friends, the Potters moved in across the street.

Dr. Woods and his wife lived across the street on the other corner. Wanda recalled that she often saw them looking out their window watching the kids play in the front yard. She laughingly told of a time that Dr. Woods called her and said he didn't want to be a nosy neighbor, but her kids had the garage remote control and were going up and down on the garage door and he was afraid they would get hurt. The Tierneys also had a clear view of their house from their front windows. Having all their five children raised and gone they enjoyed watching the young Quinns play with their friends.

The popular saying "It takes a village to raise a child" seems to have been acted out in Fernan Village in many ways. Not only did they have retired people who helped keep an eye on them as they played, they also lucked out in finding an excellent babysitter right around the corner from them. Sabrina Gottler was a young teenager who loved playing with the kids. She spent many days babysitting and entertaining the two young boys especially when Wanda was on semibedrest during her pregnancy with Katie. And now, Sabrina and her family are the Quinn's next door neighbor.

During the years that their children were growing up there were enough other young families so they had plenty of neighborhood friends. There were the Potter, Titus, Barlow,

Riding bikes wherever they wanted to go gave them freedom to explore and quick access to destinations such as the candy store downtown and Rogers ice cream. There was also quite a group of kids who met on the corner by their house to ride to school together in the morning. Tim remem-

bered seeing them circle around on their bikes while they waited for everyone to arrive, then off they'd go with Andy Potter in the lead and little Katie Quinn pedaling hard bringing up the rear.

The Quinn's need for more family space led to them doing a major remodel of their home in the late 1980's while living there. Not too long after that, a house came up for sale on the lake side of the street and they decided to purchase it. Since the house was right down the street from them they decided they could move themselves which led to some pretty inventive caravans going down the street including a couch propped on skateboards and being pushed by the kids.

While this home was in the perfect location for them, it was not a perfect fit for their family of five. This led to another complete remodel and addition to bring this house up to date and to meet the needs of a busy family with three school age children. Certainly during the years the family was all home, the spaces inside and out were always fully utilized. The Quinn family was very involved in sports, school activities, community organizations, etc. and their home was and still is the setting for many gatherings of teams, friends,

community groups and, of course, their growing family. In fact all of the Quinn's six grandchildren have their birthday parties at Wanda and Tim's.

This tradition of being family and community oriented seems to have been passed on to Wanda and Tim from their families. Tim was raised in Spokane in a large Catholic family of seven children and attended Catholic schools. Wanda was raised in Hilo, Hawaii and has certainly embraced the Hawaiian culture of hospitality and belief in helping others. Since the time they moved here, they have been active in varied medical, educational and community activities as coaches, volunteers and board members. They've set this example for their children and now for their grand-children, involving the family as often as they can.

Tim continues to enjoy his general surgery practice, with an emphasis on breast surgery. For 23 years, Tim volunteered as the medical director for Hospice of North Idaho. While in that role, he developed a deep respect for the nurses and volunteers caring for hospice patients. Tim also was a Sting soccer coach for Katie's team for almost 10 years.

Wanda began her career as a volunteer as soon as her children started school. She volunteered in the schools and on the school board and was one of the founders of EXCEL Foundation which provides grants to Coeur d'Alene School District teachers. She supervised student teachers for University of Idaho for a few years before taking her present job in Program Development with University of Idaho Coeur d'Alene.

Their belief in Coeur d'Alene public schools even during a time of double shifting and the growing pains associ-

Kevin graduated from UW with a business degree. He and his wife, Meghann, live in Yakima, WA and are co-owners of a successful brewery, Bale Breaker. Katie graduated from U of Idaho and Creighton and is a dentist with Avondale Dental. Her husband, Adam Martin, works in the Pita Pit corporate office. They also have three children; Quinn, four, Finley, two, and Jackson who is one year old.

The Quinns made the right choice for their family and still enjoy living in Fernan Lake Village. The easy access to the hospital and to downtown and the freeway, the friendly neighbors, well kept homes and proximity to the lake are as important to them now as they were 36 years ago. 
